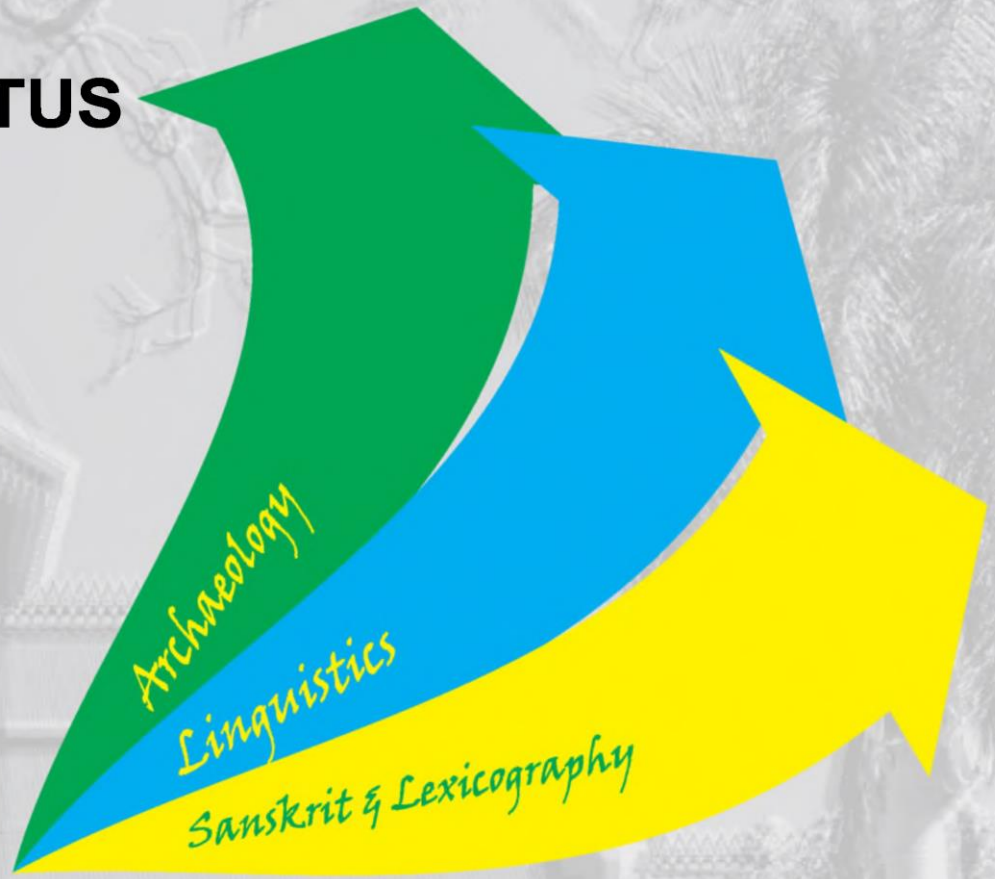

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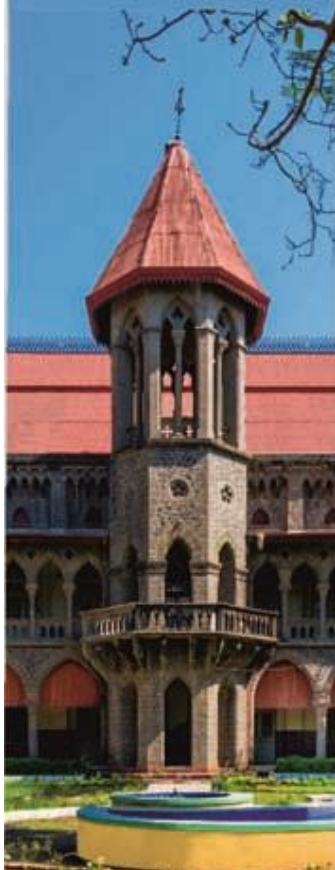
Vision

About the Deccan College



The Deccan College Post-Graduate and Research Institute (now a Deemed University), Pune, is the third oldest educational institution for higher learning in modern India. It was started on 6th October 1821 (*Vijaya Dashami*) as Hindoo College in the heart of Pune city by the Bombay Presidency Government at the initiative of the then Governor, Mountstuart Elphinstone. The Dakshina Fund, initiated earlier by the Maratha Sarsenapati Khanderao Dabhade and continued by the Peshwas for propagating Sanskrit studies, was utilised for its establishment. An English School was added to it in 1842 and the two merged together to form the Poona College on 7th June, 1851.

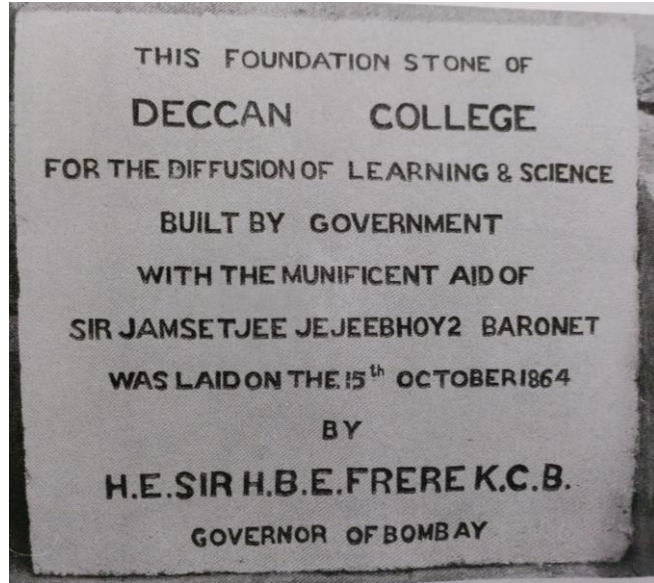

The Poona College, renamed as Deccan College on 15th October 1864 with new and specific goal of “Diffusion of Learning and Science”, was shifted to the new campus near Yerawada on 23rd March 1868. Today it is located on a sprawling campus of 115 acres of land. With the help of a munificent grant of Rs. 1.25 lakhs given by Sir Cursetjee Jamsetjee Jejeebhoy, the Second Baronet, the main building of the College was built in beautiful Neo-Gothic architecture.

The Deccan College was closed down by the British Government in 1934, but because of the legal efforts of the Past Students' Association and public-spirited citizens, a Consent Decree was passed by the Hon'ble Bombay High Court and the College was reopened on 17th August 1939 as a Post-Graduate and Research Institute, thanks to a Consent Decree passed by the Hon'ble Bombay High Court. In the next half century, the College, apart from giving instruction to postgraduate students and producing about 800 Ph.D. Dissertations, carried out outstanding research in Ancient Indian History, Culture and Archaeology, Linguistics, Medieval and Maratha History, Sociology, Anthropology and Sanskrit studies. Eminent scholars such as the late **Professors S.M. Katre, H.D. Sankalia, Irawati Karve, C.R. Sankaran, T.S. Shejwalkar, A.M. Ghatage, M.A. Mehendale, S.B. Deo, A.R. Kelkar, M.K. Dhavalikar, V.N. Misra** and others made first-rate contributions to teaching and research.

The Departments

The University has three teaching-cum-research departments: 1. Department of Ancient Indian History, Culture and Archaeology, 2. Department of Linguistics and 3. Department of Sanskrit & Lexicography.

Department of Ancient Indian History, Culture and Archaeology

The Department of A.I.H.C. and Archaeology, a premier centre for teaching and research in archaeology in South Asia, was founded by the late Professor H.D. Sankalia in 1939. This Department pioneered research in various branches of Ancient Indian Culture, Palaeolithic Archaeology, Protohistoric Archaeology and Scientific Archaeology in India. At present we have experts in Ancient Indian History, Culture, Prehistory, Protohistory, Medieval Archaeology and related scientific branches such as Cultural and Biological Anthropology, Geoarchaeology, Palaeontology, Archaeobotany, Palaeopalynology, Archaeozoology, Archaeological Chemistry and Computer Science.



Since its beginning, a large number of field-based research programmes were undertaken in various parts of the country. Some of the major excavations are as follows: Prehistoric period – Langhnaj (Gujarat); Chirki, Morgaon (Maharashtra); Bhimbetka, Samnapur, Tikoda (Madhya Pradesh); 16 R Didwana, Singhi Talav (Rajasthan), Anagwadi, Hunsgi, Yediyapur, Isampur (Karnataka); Kurnool Caves (Andhra Pradesh); Protohistoric and Historical periods – Nevasa, Inamgaon, Naikund, Mahurjhari, Chaul, Kolhapur, Daulatabad, Junnar etc. (Maharashtra); Navdatoli, Kayatha, Tripuri (Madhya Pradesh); Somnath, Kuntasi, Kotada Bhadli, Prabhas Patan, Padri (Gujarat); Ahar, Bagor, Tilwara, Balathal, Gilund (Rajasthan); Farmana, Girawad, Mitathal, Rakhigarhi, Karsola (Haryana); Kodekal, Budihal, Tekkalkota, Sanganakallu, Hallur (Karnataka); Sisupalgarh, Golbai Sasan, Harirajpur (Odisha).

The Department has a very exhaustive doctoral research programme; the topics cover all branches of Ancient Indian History, Culture and Archaeology of South Asia.

Department of Linguistics

The Department of Linguistics, founded by the late Professor S.M. Katre in 1939, is the oldest Department of modern Linguistics in India. From 1939 to 1956 the Department functioned as a Research Department known as the Department of Indo-European Linguistics, awarding Ph.D. Degrees and conducting research projects. To popularize this discipline, summer, autumn and winter schools, each of six weeks duration, were conducted at the Institute and in various other parts of the country beginning from 1954. Building on the popularity of this new discipline in India, a Post-Graduate Diploma course in Linguistics was started at this Institute in 1956. Many prominent scholars in Indian linguistics today were among the participants of the Diploma course. The year 1958 saw the beginning of a formal post-graduate programme in Linguistics at the College, the first in India of this kind in this field. In the years that have followed, alumni of this Institute have gone forth and established Departments of Linguistics in various places in the country. The Department thus played a pioneering role in developing modern Linguistics in India.



In 1963 the Department was the first one in Social Sciences to get the U.G.C. sanction as the Centre of Advanced Study and this programme ran for two successive five-years terms. The Department undertook detailed research projects covering the Vedic language, Indo-Aryan languages of Western India and literary languages of the Dravidian family. In 2011 the Department was again selected by the UGC for the award of the Special Assistance Programme (SAP). This has given a huge fillip to research activities in the Department. Faculty and students in the Department have been working on individual projects on the themes of (1) language contact (especially across language families) including the following contact situations: Marathi-Kannada, Marathi-Telugu, Marathi-Kolami, Marathi-Nahali, Gondi-Hindi, Galo-Hindi, Khasi-English, Marathi-Hindi in Nagpur, Konkani-Marathi and Arunachali-Hindi. (2) 'Survey of Dialects of the Marathi Language (SDML)' is a joint project of the Department and Rajya Marathi Vikas Sanstha, Mumbai. It was designed to conduct a dialectological study and record the regional variations in the Marathi language spoken in the state of Maharashtra. The effort is to study and trace the factors that influenced the Marathi language and try to preserve its dialects which are facing extinction. The Department has also organised national and international conferences/seminars on the same theme in recent years.

Department of Sanskrit and Lexicography

The Department of Sanskrit and Lexicography aims at diffusing scientific knowledge in the areas of Sanskrit and Lexicography. The Deccan College has a long and illustrious tradition of Sanskrit studies. It started as Hindu College in 1821 where all branches of Sanskrit were studied. The Department of Sanskrit and Lexicography presently offers M.A. and Ph.D. Degree courses in Sanskrit and Lexicography. The faculty consists of experts in various fields such as Veda, Vedānta, Vyākaraṇa, Śrauta, Mīmāṃsā, Sāhitya, Nyāya, Astronomy, Dramaturgy, Dharmaśāstra, Arthaśāstra, Buddhism, Jainism, Tantras, etc. Also, the staff members are highly experienced in the domain of Sanskrit Lexicography as they have been working in the monumental project of 'An Encyclopaedic Dictionary of Sanskrit on Historical Principles.' This is the only University Department in the country which provides for the combined study of Lexicography and Sanskrit language.

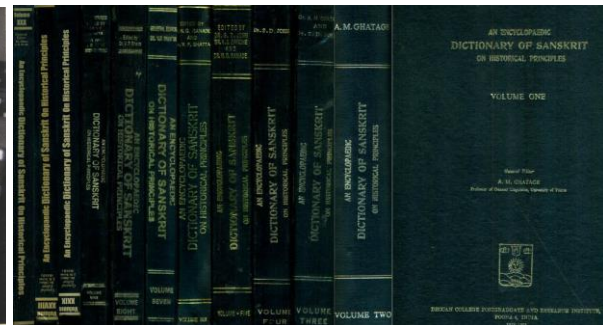


Encyclopaedic Dictionary of Sanskrit on Historical Principles

The Sanskrit-English Dictionary Project was initiated by the late Professor S.M. Katre in 1948. The Encyclopaedia traces the linguistic development of Sanskrit words from the Ṛgveda to the latest work of Hāsyārṇava (1850 A.D.). The basic resource consists of one crore vocables gathered from about 1500 works over a period of quarter-century. The Dictionary is Encyclopaedic in scope and is based on the Historical Principles. It records the semantic development of various words and provides the entire range of meanings prevalent in the Vedas and later texts. The meanings are logically analyzed and various nuances and shades are interlinked. It arranges the words and their meanings strictly following the chronological order of their references. The first volume of this project was published in 1976 under the editorship of the late Professor A.M. Ghatage. As of today 35, volumes have been published by the Department and the work is in progress.

Laboratories and Museums

Archaeology Laboratories

The Department approaches archaeology from a multidisciplinary perspective and has sophisticated laboratory facilities. This is the only University Department of Archaeology in the entire country which has well-equipped laboratories under one roof for Archaeological

Sciences such as Chemistry, Palynology, Archaeozoology, Archaeobotany, Biological Anthropology, Geoarchaeology, Sedimentology, Palaeontology, Physical Chemistry, X-Ray Diffraction and Computing. These laboratories carry out scientific analysis of archaeological remains recovered from various excavations. Their services are also extended to other institutions in the country including the Archaeological Survey of India and State Departments of Archaeology.

Language Laboratories

A LAN-based interactive language laboratory equipped with software such as Multi speech, Praat, and Wave surfer was set up in the department in 2007 with a grant provided to the department by the University Grants Commission of India. The laboratory is used to complement classroom teaching in Phonetics and Applied Linguistics and also in short-term courses conducted by the department. The Computational Linguistics Lab is a research and educational lab in the Department of Linguistics. It is used to supplement classroom teaching of the courses in Computational Linguistics. The lab sessions include demonstrations and hands on experience of the relevant online tool.

Archaeology Museum

The Archaeology Department has a large museum which occupies almost the entire first floor of the building. It has eight main galleries devoted to prehistory, protohistory, Iron Age, historical archaeology, art, epigraphy and numismatics, science in archaeology and ethnoarchaeology. These galleries display stone tools, pottery, metal artefacts, human burials,

coins, beads and other ornaments, inscriptions, animal fossils, and tribal ethnographic materials, etc. found in excavations and collected otherwise over the last 80 years. The galleries cover a total floor space of about 15,000 sq. ft. The exhibits cover from the Stone Age to the medieval period.

This museum has a threefold aim: a) to educate the public about the country's cultural heritage; b) to make the antiquity collections available for research purposes; and c) use of the museum galleries for teaching purposes. It has fulfilled these goals to the fullest extent and has thus won a coveted place in Pune city.

Maratha History Museum

The Maratha History Museum is another museum on the Deccan College campus. It has two major sections. One Section displays archival materials of various kinds and objects pertaining to Maratha history, which were originally a personal collection of Shri. D.B. Parasnis. Later the collection was acquired by the Government and exhibited as part of the Satara Historical Museum. Finally, in 1939 it was transferred to the Deccan College. The second Section displays objects of various types belonging to the Maratha and colonial periods. These were originally the private historical collections of the chief of the Maratha princely state of Jamkhindi in Karnataka and were donated to the Deccan College in 1958.



This museum possesses gazillion cloth-bundles holding old Marathi documents in Modi script, manuscripts, palm-leaf works, copper-plate grants, rare books, old maps, paintings,

coins, pieces made of -- iron, brass, bronze, German silver, marble ivory, sandalwood and others. Not only this, the museum also has more than one hundred Maratha and British arms and weapons like different types of swords, daggers, spears, bows, arrows, small guns, and shields.

As part of public education programme, these two museums conduct outreach programmes such as one-day teachers' workshops (since 1996) and participate in exhibitions in Pune and also other places including villages.

Library

The Deccan College Library is a specialised library in the country. It has rich collections required for postgraduate teaching and research in the fields of Archaeology, Ancient Indian History, Medieval History, Anthropology, Sociology, Linguistics, Sanskrit, Philosophy and Religion. There is also a good collection of works in Natural Sciences. It has a collection of more than 1,80,000 works (books & periodicals). The rich collection of over 11,000 manuscripts in Sanskrit and Marathi available in the library is used for research in all the branches of Sanskrit/Marathi literature. Spread over a total carpet area of about 42,000 sq.ft., the library has spacious stack-rooms, reference and reading rooms and 40 independent study rooms for research scholars.



True to the character of Deccan College as a research institute, the library gives open access facility to the faculty and students. The library services are being availed by the students and research scholars from all parts of India and even outside. The library subscribes to around 150 Indian and foreign 'core' journals of Archaeology, Linguistics and Sanskrit. Further it receives publications from about 175 prestigious institutes in India and outside in exchange for its annual Research Bulletin & other publications. The Deccan College library has built up an exhaustive and useful reference collection consisting of various Dictionaries, Encyclopaedias, Atlases, Gazetteers, Census Reports, Annuals, Directories, Archaeological Reports and Memoirs, Linguistic Survey of India Reports etc. It also houses a good collection of works in allied fields such as Science & Technology, Art & Architecture, Botany, Ecology, Geology, Palaeontology, Agriculture, Geography, Sociology, Psychology, Education, Marathi, Ayurveda, Medicine, and Mysticism.



The library is fully automated. It has installed 'Slim 21' Library management software and developed a bibliographic database of its entire collection, which is accessible through Web OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue). This library is getting online access to databases like JSTOR, Wiley Publishing, Taylor & Francis, Springer Journals, Cambridge University Press, J-Gate, ISID and Economic and Political Weekly etc. under UGC INFLIBNET's e-Shodh Sindhu Consortium and Under National Knowledge Network (NKN) project this University has got 100 MBPS Internet Connectivity. A Digital Library of Deccan College Publications, Bulletin, Manuscripts, Theses & Dissertations and books published between 1523 and 1940 has also been set up which is accessible on Intranet. Besides this, Wi-Fi, On-line Search, and Printing facility are available to its users.

Admission Procedure for Masters

1. For Indian Students

- a. A student seeking admission to the M.A. degree course at this University shall apply online in the prescribed form. The downloaded online application form is to

be submitted with a passport-size photo affixed on it together with attested copies of the documents listed below, must reach the Academic Section by the due date.

- i) Marks-lists of the following qualifying examinations: SSC, HSC, and Graduation.
- ii) Character certificate from the Head of the Department/Institution from which the student has obtained his qualifying degree.

NOTE: a. Incomplete applications will not be considered.

b. If a student while applying for admission is unable to submit statement of marks of the final Bachelor's degree examination because the result is not declared, he shall submit copies of previous year's degree examination (i.e. S.Y.) marksheet.

- b. Admission to a course will initially remain provisional. It will be confirmed when all the documents (original and xerox) specified below are submitted along with the eligibility application and they are accepted. Eligibility applications will be submitted by the students after the provisional admission process is over. Failure to submit the eligibility application along with these documents will lead to withholding permission to appear for the semester- end examination/withholding declaration of the examination result / cancellation of the admission at any time of the degree course or any other measure to be decided by the authorities.
 - i. Migration Certificate. (No objection certificate from the University last attended)
 - ii. Mark-list of the last qualifying examination.
 - iii. Degree/Passing certificate.
 - iv. Character certificate from the Head of the Department/Institute from which the student has obtained his qualifying degree.

2. For Foreign Students

- a. A foreign student seeking admission to the M.A. degree course shall apply for admission in the prescribed form. The downloaded online application form is to be submitted with a passport size photo affixed on it and accompanied by attested copies of following documents must reach the Academic Section by the due date.
 - i. Statement of Marks of the last qualifying degree examination (Bachelor's degree)
 - ii. Degree/Passing certificate
 - iii. Migration certificate (No objection certificate from the University / Institute last attended)
 - iv. Character certificate from the Head of the Department/Institute from which the student has obtained his last qualifying degree.
 - v. Documentary proof regarding date of birth.

NOTE: Incomplete application will not be considered for admission.

- b. Having been found prima facie eligible for admission to the M.A. degree course, the student will be given a provisional admission letter by which he/she can obtain Student Visa for study at this University. (Admission will not be granted to the course without a proper Student Visa).
- c. On obtaining the Student Visa the student shall arrive at the Deccan College and submit original copies of the certificates listed in (a) above as also the Student Visa.
- d. English Language Test:
 - i. The medium of instruction for the M.A. degree programme at this Institute is English. It is therefore essential that the student has a sound knowledge of English Language. He shall therefore appear for an English Language Test. Only those students who pass the Test shall be admitted to the M.A. degree programme.
 - ii. The following students shall however be exempted from appearing for this Test:
 - a. who are native speakers of English language or have graduated with English as the medium of instruction.
 - b. who hold a scholarship of the Indian Council for Cultural Relations.
 - c. who have migrated from an Indian University and have passed an English Language test of that University.
 - d. Who have successfully completed a English language course (of minimum 3 months duration) from a recognized Institute.
 - e. who have passed the test conducted by this Institute during their admission to an earlier degree course.
 - iii. The English Language Test shall be conducted once a year, preferably in the beginning of the academic year or as convenient to the University.
 - iv. The Test shall be of two and half hour's duration and shall contain objective type questions in general English and grammar. The paper will be of 100 marks. To be eligible to pass a student must secure 40 marks.
 - v. Help of the following staff shall be taken in conduct of the Test.
 - a. Examiner
 - b. Supervisor
 - c. Hall Attendant
 - vi. A member of the teaching staff of the Department of Linguistics may be appointed by the Director of the Institute, to work as an Examiner for the Test. The Examiner, the Supervisor and Hall Attendant appointed for the Test shall be paid remuneration as per rules from the admission fee collected from the foreign students.

e. **Medical Test:**

To ensure that a student admitted to the M.A. degree has sound health, all foreign students shall undergo a medical fitness test as detailed below. However, students who have already appeared for the medical test, conducted by this Institute, during their earlier admission to a degree course of this Institute, shall be exempted from appearing for this Test.

- i. For medical fitness the students shall be subjected to a general medical check-up which shall include HIV Test, chest X-ray and other tests essential for the medical check-up.
- ii. Till such time that the Institute is able to provide medical facility of its own, the medical test shall be carried out at Inlaks and Budhrani Hospital. Expenditure on these tests including incidental expenses shall be made from the admission fee collected from the foreign students.
- iii. Only those students who are found medically fit shall be admitted to the M.A. degree programme.

Examination, Evaluation & Terms of Passing

Examination and Evaluation

A minimum of 75 percent attendance at lectures, laboratory work and field work in each paper will be necessary for qualifying to appear in the examination. The examination for each semester shall consist of:

- A) Internal Assessment, and
- B) University Examination.

The ratio of (A) and (B) shall be 20:80 marks.

Internal Assessment

Internal Assessment, for each paper, will consist of: Home assignment/ Class test/ Field or Laboratory report - 20 Marks.

University Examination

The University Examination will consist of a written test of 80 marks for each paper except dissertation.

Terms of Passing

To be eligible to pass in a paper a student should secure minimum pass marks, i.e., 40% marks (Internal Assessment and University examination marks taken together).

NOTE:

Examination for the backlog papers of a semester will be held only when that particular semester- end examination is being held for regular students.

A student will be permitted to carry over a backlog of not more than two papers to the next semester. However, in exceptional cases the Departmental Committee may waive this condition and permit the student to enroll for the next semester.

Payment and Refund of Fees

I. PAYMENT OF FEES

The fees prescribed for last semester/ Instalment/ Examination etc. shall be paid in full. Part payment of these fees will not be accepted.

All fees shall be paid, by the due date (together with late fee, where specified). Foreign students may pay the fees prescribed in US Dollars, in equivalent Indian Rupees.

Failure to pay the prescribed fees by the due date will lead to cancellation of admission to the course / hostel and/or exclusion from appearing in the examination / or payment of fine as prescribed.

- *Indian Student:* Within Maharashtra (WM): Passed qualifying exam from a University within Maharashtra / Domicile of Maharashtra.
- *Outside Maharashtra* (OM): Passed qualifying exam from a University outside Maharashtra.
- US \$700- for foreign students who have migrated from a foreign University & US \$400 for foreign students who have migrated from Indian University.

II. REFUND OF FEES

If a student decides to discontinue the course after paying all the fees, the tuition and other compulsory fees will be refunded, after deducting 25% of the total amount of these fees paid, towards administrative charges, provided he/she submits a written application within one month (30days) from the date he/she takes admission to the course. Application for refund shall not be considered after the due date.

Library and Hostel deposits will be refunded after the student submits No Dues Certificates from the Librarian and the Estate Office.

Eligibility Criteria for Ph.D.

1. For Archaeology

- a) M.A. in A.I.H.C. & Archaeology or M.A. Archaeology or Masters in any branch of Archaeology (such as Prehistory, Protohistory, Ancient studies, Bioarchaeology, Scientific Archaeology, Indology, Anthropology)

*The Research Proposal shall be prepared by the student in consultation with his proposed guide and shall be signed by both. The title of the Ph.D. thesis suggested should be such that no work of similar nature has been done or is being done. Research Proposal shall consist of:

- i. Current status of knowledge of the topic of research;
- ii. Aims of proposed research and methodology to be adopted;
- iii. Nature of the data to be collected; Proposed method of analysis and interpretation; Expected contribution to the knowledge of the subject; and
- iv. A detailed bibliography of the literature on the topic of research.

NOTE: *Students are requested to note that their application will not be considered for admission if the above certificates are not enclosed with their application.*

- b) (i) Admission to the Ph.D. degree programme shall be done through an Entrance Test. Students who have passed GATE/NET/SET/ M.Phil/JRF Examination in the relevant subject of the apex bodies as CSIR/UGC/ICAR/ICMR/DBT will be exempted from the Entrance Test.
(ii) If a candidate already holds a Ph.D. degree in a related subject from a recognized University, he/she may be exempted from entrance tests and course work for admission to Ph.D.
(iii) For Entrance Test there would be two papers i.e., Paper I and Paper II. Paper I would be General Aptitude Test of 50 marks & Paper II would be subject wise of 50 marks. General Aptitude Test will have 25 questions with multiple choice covering Research & Teaching Aptitude, Logical thinking, General Comprehension, etc. The test shall be conducted by the University. The Second Written Test will pertain to the subject of the Department concerned & the test shall be of 50 marks. i.e., 20 marks for Objective type exam and 30 marks for short essay type questions. After passing the both tests the student will appear before the Department concerned for interview.
(iv) Only those students who have passed entrance test shall appear for an interview to be organized by the Department concerned.
(v) At the time of interview, doctoral candidates are expected to discuss their research interest/ area.
(vi) Only the predetermined number of students may be admitted to Ph.D. programme.
- c) While granting admission to students to Ph.D. Programme, the Institute will pay due attention to the State Reservation Policy.
- d) If the application for admission is accepted by the Institute the student will be intimated accordingly. The admission shall initially remain provisional. Before taking provisional admission to the Ph.D. degree course the student shall submit eligibility application along with original and xerox copies of the following certificates.
 1. Migration Certificate (No objection certificate from the University last attended)
 2. Passing/Degree certificate of the last qualifying degree examination
 3. Mark-list of the last qualifying degree examination

4. Character certificate (from the head of the Institute from which the student has obtained his qualifying degree.

- e) The offer of admission to the Ph.D. degree programme shall remain valid for a period of one year from the date of issue of the provisional admission letter.

The application form duly filled in by the student in his own hand with a passport size photo affixed on it together with attested copies of following documents must reach the Academic Section through the Indian Embassy/High Commission in their respective countries. They will be admitted to the course only after they have been found eligible.
1. Migration certificate (no objection certificate from the University last attended)
 2. Passing/Degree certificate of the last qualifying degree examination
 3. Marks-list of the last qualifying degree examination
 4. Character certificate from the Head of the institution from which the student has obtained his qualifying degree.
 5. Documentary proof regarding date of birth
 6. Research Proposal*
 7. No objection certificate from the employer (if employed)

*Research Proposal shall be prepared by the student in consultation with his proposed guide and shall be signed by both. The title of the Ph.D. thesis suggested should be such that no work of similar nature has been done or is being done. Research Proposal shall consist of:

- i. Current status of knowledge of the topic of research;
- ii. Aims of proposed research and methodology to be adopted; iii Nature of the data to be collected;
- iv. Proposed method of analysis and interpretation;

 - iv. A member of the teaching staff of the Department of Linguistics/ Archaeology/Sanskrit may be appointed by the Director of the Institute, to work as Paper-setter and Examiner for the Test. The Supervisor and Hall Attendant shall be appointed from the administrative and class IV staff respectively.

g) Medical Test:

To ensure that a student admitted to the Ph.D. degree has sound health, all foreign students shall undergo a medical fitness test as detailed below. However, students who have already appeared for the medical test, conducted by this Institute, during their earlier admission to a degree course of this Institute, shall be exempted from appearing for this Test. Only those students who are found medically fit shall be admitted to the Ph.D. degree programme.

- i. For medical fitness the students shall be subjected to the following tests:
 - a) HIV Test (Aids Test)
 - b) Chest Check-up (through X-Ray)
 - c) General Medical Test
- ii. Till such time that the Institute is able to provide medical facility to carry out the above tests, they shall be done at Inlaks and Budhrani Hospital or at a hospital to be specified later. Expenditure on these tests including incidental expenses shall be made by the Institute from the medical test fees collected from the student.
- iii. Only those students who are found medically fit shall be admitted to the Ph.D. degree programme.

h) PH.D. COURSEWORK

All registered PhD students in the University will complete the following compulsory coursework's as a pre-requisite for making the pre-submission presentation:

2. The Certificate Course in Research and Publication Ethics

DURATION: TWO MONTHS

TOTAL: 2 CREDITS

This course has total 6 units focusing on basis of philosophy of science and ethics, research integrity, publication ethics. Hands-on sessions are designed to identify research misconduct and predatory publication. Indexing and citation databases, open access publications, research (citations, h-index, Impact Factor, etc) and plagiarism tools will be introduced in this course. The criteria for assessment is as mentioned below.

1. Students, who have 75% attendance, will be considered eligible for the final test.
2. The procedure of assessment will be divided into three sections:
 - a. Mid-Term Test consist of 25 marks giving multiple options of questions (MCQ, fill in the blanks, yes/no, true/false, etc.)
 - b. Assignments (Practical and group discussion session, etc.) consists of 25 marks.
 - c. A descriptive written test of 50 marks based on the part of the syllabus covered in the General Sessions on RPE Course.
